from Rev Edward Keene Curate of Little Shelford



Dear friends,

"It's the most wonderful time of the year", crooned the American singer Andy Williams in 1963 (and as many cover artists have done since). The 'most wonderful time', that is, unless one particularly values warm dry sunny evenings and affordable energy bills!

Such familiar Christmas songs have been filling the radio airwaves since mid-November, helping us to gear up for "the big day".

At All Saints Parish Church our own preparation for Christmas has involved a number of approaches. For one thing, we have been lighting candles on the traditional wreath week by week, each candle representing one of the four Sundays in Advent. The final fifth candle will be lit at our Christmas Day services (see back cover for details).

Another approach has seen our sermon series follow a number of key characters from Bible history who blazed a trail ahead of Jesus' arrival at the first Christmas. This has included consideration of familiar figures like Adam, Abraham, and Moses, but also less familiar ones like Ruth.



Ruth was what we might think of today as an international migrant. She was a Moabite (roughly where the modern country of Jordan is) who left her homeland, her family, and all that she had known in order to accompany her Hebrew mother-in-law Naomi back to Israel. Naomi's hometown was a small place, probably of similar population size to Little Shelford today.

Fortunately for Ruth (and Naomi), on her arrival in the new neighbourhood she encountered a very kind and selfless man called Boaz who gave her protection and provision. Even in our own day, it is less common for women to

propose to men (rather than vice versa), but it was almost unheard of in the ancient world. Yet, this is exactly what Ruth did to Boaz. She asked him to marry her...and he did!

The book of Ruth ends with the happy news that Ruth and Boaz had a baby together, a boy named Obed. Just a random happy 'boy meets girl'

story that somehow found its way into the Bible? Hardly. Obed was the grandfather of a certain David. That is, *King* David to you and me.

The town to which Naomi had led Ruth? Bethlehem. Yes, that same Bethlehem to which some other weary travellers would come some thousand years later, under the orders of a Roman Emperor. And the same Bethlehem in which would be born another little baby boy, descended of the house and line of David, born in the city of David, the son of Jesse, the son of Obed, the son of Ruth the Moabite.

The Christmas story is more than just a few well-worn carol service readings. As Jesus himself told his disciples "Everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms."

SCOWP Shelford Community Orchard and Woodland Project

The Community Orchard is expanding to double in size.

Since September some of the paddock to the left of the existing orchard, as approached from Garden Fields, has been turned over to the Community Orchard and will be developed over the coming vears.



It was mown mechanically, being far too large an area and the grass too overgrown for scything. Seven new standard trees will be planted at the ditch end of this area in December and new walking paths will be established and maintained.

This new land will approximately double our meadow area and gives us an exciting opportunity to explore the planting of more exotic species to reflect how the climate is changing. One idea being considered is to plant trees such as olives which are naturally adapted to hot and dry conditions; if anyone has such trees which may have overgrown the pots they were growing in please let us know and we would be happy to plant them out. Who knows, in 20 years time, it may be possible to harvest olives as well as apples, pears, gages and quinces.



2022 has been a good year for the Community Orchard and Woodland Project. Despite the very hot and dry weather over the summer, our dedicated team of watering volunteers kept all the trees and most of the smaller hedge and scrub whips alive. The small-leafed lime, planted as part of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebration at the entrance looks to be in good condition and hopefully will burst into life in the Spring.

The existing meadow was cut in sections by scythe and the cut hay allowed to lie in piles to suppress the grass underneath; these piles will be cleared and sown with some wild flower seed in the hope of increasing the diversity of plant life. The yellow rattle planted last year went well and should have seeded more widely to expand again naturally next year. A new bench has been very generously donated by Mr and Mrs Fox and has been installed on the eastern side of the orchard, just past the entrance.
