Around Little Shelford

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#### Dear friends,

It is lovely to be back in Little Shelford after some time away from parish responsibilities. I have recently been allowed a 12 week period of sabbatical – a boon which comes around for clergy every ten years or so. The conclusion of my leave comes this week with a walking trip up to Scotland.

I try and go North annually for a few days with some friends, to climb Munros (the name for the 283 Scottish mountains over 3000 ft). It's a hobby which began for me 35 years ago in 1989 with an ascent of An Gearanach. For those not in the know, that mountain is in the famed Ring of Steall, near Ben Nevis. It is itself one of the lowliest Munros – and I hated nearly every minute of it! 'Why would anyone do this to themselves?', I wondered, as I forced my guide to get me off the ridge by descending a vertical peat bog to the glen below.

But I was well and truly bitten by the mountains (not just by the midges). And most years since then I have been back and added to my list. There is nothing magical about the figure of 3,000 feet that makes a mountain special, of course. But I fit the stereotype which likes lists and the codification of achievements and it helps me to knock off each peak I scale in an orderly fashion.

I have no ambition to climb all of them. In fact, when I was 50, I wondered about bowing out at that stage, if I could just get my fiftieth Munro around my fiftieth birthday. I managed. Here is a photo of my number 50 - a prize if anyone can identify it.



But about that time, at one of the early Little Shelford safari suppers, one of our diners made an alternative suggestion. How about setting myself the aim to keep up with my age by adding at least one Munro each year? I would be unlikely ever to complete the list (!) But that goal would be manageable for a few years yet – and I could even bank enough credit for the occasional year off by doing more than one Munro sometimes. It proved to be a great suggestion. Now in my 60<sup>th</sup> year, I have a healthy balance of 63.

I am basically very cautious and a fair weather walker. And whatever the weather this week (first snow of autumn up high, apparently), I'm reassured to know I do not have to nab another Munro until 2028. But I love the time out afforded by travelling long distances at walking speed. It is a wonderful way to slow down the pace of life.

As an afterthought on the theme of mountains I am reminded of some wonderful words from the prophet Isaiah:

'Though the mountains be shaken and the hills be removed, yet my unfailing love for you will not be shaken nor my covenant of peace be removed,' says the LORD, who has compassion on you. (Isaiah 54:10)

Never mind my 60 years – those mountains in Scotland have been around for millions of years. They are wonderfully hefty and solid and they aren't going anywhere any time soon. And that is the image God uses to describe his love for his people – however much their circumstances might at times seem to shift and shake. We can depend on him. That is surely something for me to hold on to for the next few decades and beyond!

# **Shelford School News September 2024**

In 1849, French writer Jean-Baptiste Alphonse Karr wrote, "plus ça change, plus c'est la même chose" - "the more things change, the more they stay the same." A saying that might well have been written to describe the annual cycle of the academic year.

When the school said goodbye to 28 Year 6 pupils at the end of July it had already begun the process of welcoming 30 small 4 year-old children into the Reception class (and they always do seem **very** small). At the start of term in September there will be a new class of Year 6 pupils who will not only have grown physically over the summer but will have grown in stature as they take on new responsibilities.

The summer issue of the newsletter was published some time before the activities to mark the end of the school year took place. Here is a summary.

On July the 5th, despite a dull and drizzly morning, Sports Day took place in dry and, eventually, sunny weather. The afternoon began with Maypole dancing from Year 6 before all pupils engaged in a range of sporting activities, ably assisted by "Sports Leaders" from Sawston Village College.

Prize Giving took place on July the 17th. Prizes were given to those pupils in each class who had made the most progress in Maths (the Ada Lovelace Award), English (the Philippa Pearce Award) or Science (the Paduano Science Award).

With the end of term rapidly approaching there came a flurry of activity which included music performances and the Year 6 production of "Sherlock and Cinderella" (and yes, there was a Fairy Godmother).

In the last week of term Year 6 enjoyed an afternoon visit to Cara Coffee where they were able to choose from a selection of drinks, ices, cookies and cupcakes.

Thanks are due to the cafe staff for their welcome and to the donor who provided the funds.

The term ended with the traditional Leavers' Service in St. Mary's Church where parents and other guests were delighted by the singing of the Year 6 choir and a humorous or touching memory from every pupil. The service was followed by a reception at school where each pupil was presented with a Bible and a Year Book.

# New telephone system - call back option

Some patients have reported the call back option not working for them. To use this service, when you are prompted, please press option 1, but then you also need to listen to the next message and press option 1 again. There is also an option to receive a call back to a different telephone number.

#### **Long Term Conditions (LTC)**

If you have a long term health condition such as asthma, COPD or diabetes, we aim to review you and your medication in or around your birth month. When it is time, you will receive a letter or text message asking you to book an LTC appointment.

#### **Accurx Patient Triage**

We have an online consultation service that patients can use for routine medical questions and queries. #### Flu Vaccinations 2024

This year NHS England have informed us that the routine annual adult Flu programme for adults aged 18 years old upwards will start on the 3rd October. To ensure you have maximum protection for the flu season you should be vaccinated in October preferably, but certainly by the end of November. Flu numbers start to rise in November and peak in December & January.

However, there are 3 groups of people who should be vaccinated early and we encourage you to be vaccinated in one of our September clinics.

# Those who are pregnant (especially if near due date), because:

- Pregnant women are at higher risk from complications from flu
- To protect the baby during pregnancy (for example flu infection increases the risks of the baby being premature or stillborn)

To protect the baby in the first few months of life (babies aged under 6 months are at high risk of complications from flu)

#### Children, because:

- The protection from the flu vaccine lasts longer in children
- Children tend to be "super spreaders"
- Getting your child vaccinated not only protects your child but also their grandparents, vulnerable parents and will reduce the spread of flu to the wider population

# People due to have treatment such as chemotherapy, because:

If you are due to have treatment that will weaken your immune system, such as chemotherapy, the vaccine given before treatment starts will work better as your immune system is stronger.

'Wilding' film – some of you may have seen this at the Arts Cinema in Cambridge or at Saffron Screen. It is based on the book of that title by Isabella Tree, and has the most beautiful photography of animals, birds and landscapes. She and her husband were farming land in Sussex which was marginal, and it was only vast amounts of fertilisers and pesticides,





and the subsidies that kept them going. After being inspired by rewilding projects in the Netherlands, they decided to stop farming and create conditions to allow their land to go back to nature. They have tried to make conditions as near to ancient times as possible, with Exmoor ponies, old cattle breeds, Tamworth pigs, and deer. You may have seen the Konik ponies at Wicken Fen, they are a wild breed too. The herds are managed but roam free. These large herbivores create conditions that increase insect

life, butterflies, and birds, and rare species have found their way to their land, such as turtle doves nesting. The couple have "re-wiggled" the river, which has reduced the risk of flooding downstream, even introducing beavers, and over the years have built a successful ecobusiness there, with visitors, tours, workshops, and so on. For marginal land which cannot be farmed economically or sustainably, this is a wonderful success story for nature.



# **Celebrating 100 years of Walrus Cruises**

Former local GP, Dr Robin Church, and his older brother, John, had a starring role cutting the Centenary cake to celebrate 100 years since the Christian holiday sailing camps known as "The Walrus Cruises" were set up by their father, Dr Joe Church, who was previously a resident of 18 Church Street, Little Shelford and is now buried in the churchyard at All Saints.

They celebrated with a large crowd of past and present sailors and had a chance to sail in a Half-Decker boat from Martham Boatyard near Hickling Broad, Norfolk. Listening to the logs and shanties stirred many



memories as the present camps still share the same recitations and songs every evening after a challenging day's sailing. The fascinating exhibition including photos from the start of the camps in 1924 was of



great interest. They took part in a lively outdoor Thanksgiving Service and met many friends from the past. It was encouraging to see how the Walrus cruises are as popular as ever.

Who would have predicted that their father's vision as a young doctor would have been carried forward and thrived for all these years? Next year's camps are already booked well in advance.

# History Snippet: Is Pippa Heylings Little Shelford's First Liberal MP?

There was a great deal of excitement in Little Shelford when Liberal Democrat, Pippa Heylings, was elected to be our MP, replacing Anthony Brown, the Conservative MP, at the General Election in June. But is Pippa the first ever Liberal MP to represent Little Shelford? Well, it would appear not, she is the first for some time but recent research revealed that our village has been a hot bed of Liberal political activity before.

The source is the **Cambridge Independent Press of 1889** where I alighted across a heading "Liberal Meeting at Little Shelford". It gives an interesting insight into politics in the late 19<sup>th</sup> Century, a time when not every man and certainly no women were able to vote! The article reveals that a very large political meeting took place in the grounds of Shelford Hall. The meeting consisted of long speeches, calls for Irish Home Rule (one of the hottest political topics of the time), a large crowd of 1,000 people and a cricket match. What political meeting in Little Shelford could be without a cricket match!

These are the key characters involved from Little Shelford along with some celebrity visitors. There are also mention of some key features of Little Shelford still well known today.

**Mr Hugh Edward Hoare**, then resident at Shelford Hall (the Wale Family were renting the Hall by then) and Liberal Candidate for the Western Division of Cambridgeshire and later MP for the area.

Hugh Edward Hoare was the sixth son of Henry Hoare, banker, of Iden Park, Staplehurst, Kent and his wife was Mary Lady Marsham, daughter of the 2nd Earl of Romney. He was educated at Eton College and Balliol College, Oxford, was a partner in the brewery company of Hoare and Company, Lower East Smithfield, and was on the boards of the New England Breweries and the United States Brewery Company.



At the 1892 general election he was elected as Liberal member of parliament for the Western or Chesterton Division of Cambridgeshire, which included the Village of Little Shelford. He heralded Pippa's success by taking the seat from the Conservatives. But he failed to hold the seat at the subsequent election in 1895 or regain it in 1900. He then retired from politics and devoted himself to his brewing interests and became a director of the National Provident Institution. He died suddenly at his residence, Bix Hall, Henley on Thames, Oxfordshire in July 1929, aged 75.

**Mr J C Flynn MP**, an Irish nationalist politician who served for 25 years as a member of the Irish Parliamentary Party in the House of Commons of what was then the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. Flynn was elected at the 1885 general election as the Member of Parliament (MP) for North Cork and was re-elected unopposed at the next 5 general elections. He held his seat until he stood down from the Commons at the January 1910 general election. He was arrested under the Crimes Act in February 1888 for conspiracy, the year before he spoke to the big meeting in Little Shelford.

**The Rev Thomas Joseph Laurence,** who presided over the meeting at Shelford Hall. The Rev Laurence was born in 1849 in Chesterton and was educated at the Perse Grammar School. In 1873 he was elected Vice-President of the Union Society and later a fellow of Downing College Cambridge. In 1883 he was appointed Deputy Professor of International Law and appointed Warden of Cavendish College. He went on to become the leading International Lawyer of his time as well as Canon of Salisbury Cathedral

# The Meeting and Cricket Match

The meeting was held at Shelford Hall, on the Whittlesford Road, the site of the meeting, since destroyed by Fire in 1922 (see Little Shelford Village History Web site) while the Little Shelford Cricket Pitch, still used by Little Shelford Cricket Club today, in the grounds of Shelford Hall is now the Wale Recreation Ground.

Here are some details from the article which replicated the political speeches at great length. But of more interest to current village residents would be the setting and style of the day.

In beautiful weather a very successful Liberal demonstration took place Tuesday in the grounds of Shelford Hall, at which place Mr. Hugh E.

Hoare, the Liberal candidate for the Western Division of Cambridgeshire, is now residing.

A cricket match was played during the day between teams representing the North and South of West Cambridgeshire. The former being captained by Mr. P. H. Young, of Cambridge, and the latter by Mr Hoare. After an enjoyable and most exciting game, the Southerners were victorious by five runs. Some capital cricket was shown by both sides, the most notable being the batting of H Carpenter, of the Essex County Eleven, for the winners, and the vigorous batting of George Watts, the Surrey Colt, for the losers. The captains of the respective teams also showed good form.

[The article printed the whole scorecard but, for the record, the North team scored 147 runs and the South 152, Mr Carpenter scored 38 runs and Mr Watts 64 runs while Mr Young scored 37 and Mr Hoare 10]

Mr. Hoare entertained the cricketers and a few friends to a capital luncheon, at the close of which Mr. J. M. Logan proposed "The Health of Mr. Hoare," which was honoured with enthusiasm. Mr. Hoare suitably responded.

In the evening a public meeting was held in a large marque erected la the grounds adjoining Shelford Hall, at which over 1,000 persons were present. The Rev. T J Lawrence presided over the meeting; other noted attendees included Rev G Jones of Histon, Rev W Higgins of Melbourn, Rev J Canple of Melborn. [Many other worthy locals were listed by name, from all over Cambridgeshire, while the clergy of Little and Great Shelford are notably absent!). Among the ladies present were Lady Chesterfield, Mrs Hoare, Miss Briscoe, Mrs Lawrence, Miss Young, and deputation of Cambridge ladies [Who, of course, had no vote at the time!].
