The usual pattern of Sunday services is:

9.30 am - A family service where adults and children join together for the first half hour before children leave for their own teaching groups:

All Saints Minis (0-Year 1), All Saints Kids (Year 2-6), Pathfinders (age 11-14).

11.00 am - A quieter, more reflective service.

6.00 pm - Sunday @ 6 is a relaxed and informal service with contemporary songs. All Saints Youth, the group for 14 to 18 year olds, meets before this service.

During school holidays and at special times of the year (e.g., Christmas and Easter) the pattern of services and activities may change.

Regular Mid-week Activities

Home Groups meet for Bible study, prayer and fellowship on Monday and Wednesday evenings and Wednesday afternoon.

A **Church Prayer Meeting** replaces Home Groups once a month.

A **Women's Group** meets on Thursday mornings.

All Saints Tots meets on Wednesday mornings in the Village Hall.

Don't forget, there are Prescription Collection Points at Sawston, Linton and Shelford. Sign up today via cpicb.grantadispensing@nhs.net to pick up your medication at your convenience over the holidays, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week – including Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Years' Day.

Be prepared for common health problems by keeping a well-stocked medicine cabinet at home. You can treat many minor illnesses such as colds and coughs, sore throats, and upset stomachs by having a supply of health care essentials such as pain relief (paracetamol / ibuprofen), cough and sore throat remedies, a first aid kit, upset stomach treatment, rehydration treatment and heartburn / indigestion treatment. Having these essentials at home will not only save you time and help you feel better quicker, but will also help save the NHS much needed resources.

Your local pharmacist can offer you advice and guidance on the best treatment for you. They are available on every high street and in supermarkets, with many open in the evening and at weekends.

Pharmacists can now also prescribe some medications under the "Pharmacy First" service. Please go to https://www.england.nhs.uk/primary-care/pharmacy/pharmacy-first/ for further information and eligibility criteria.

The Shelfords WI

At our November Meeting Eleanor Witter introduced our speaker Neil Callan who with his wife Clare shared with us their infectious joint love of gardening.

Some years ago, they began to develop threequarters of an acre of Fen soil from almost nothing, other than a few good trees, into an interesting, colourful and productive garden. Few of us had known that under the fen soil are layers of shells from when it was under the sea. That makes the peaty soil alkaline as opposed to upland peat that is acidic. Clare claims that they had no real plan but the garden now has areas that are stunning at different times of the year.

Neil and Clare are good photographers and treated us to projected images of their 'Garden through the Year' including close ups of many of the flowers starting with wintersweet and snowdrops in the early spring, through the usual and unusual flowers of later spring. Their real passion is for the family of May-flowering bearded irises shown in more superb shots. After naming over 70 plants in the photographs, the year ended with the garden blanketed in snow and trees covered in hoar frost. Winter, we were told, is actually a busy time for them with hedging producing mounds of woody stems and branches that can't be composted but that in the countryside can still be burnt on a controlled bonfire.

Throughout we were told what went well but also comfortingly for many of us what didn't thrive or survive, which plants do well in wet/dry soil and which need sun/shade or do well anywhere. Gardens are not static, they continuously evolve. Some of their most colourful irises were potted up for us to buy

After they had answered some excellent questions, Eleanor thanked our Speakers and then followed more lively conversation over coffee/tea and biscuits.

Our regular meetings continue with a Christmas Party and craft work on 7th December followed by Lestyn Edwards with 'My Tutu went AWOL!' on 2nd January 2025. To find out more you will be very welcome to join us at our usual venue, the Community Room behind St Mary's Church, Great Shelford, on the first Thursday of each month at 7.30pm.

What is SSYI? We are a community-based charity formed by local Christians serving the villages of Great and Little Shelford, Stapleford, Sawston and Duxford.

What do we do? We provide youth activities and clubs open to all local 11–18-year-olds. We particularly focus on those who are marginalised, isolated, at-risk or not accessing other youth provision.

The outcomes we aim for by building positive relationships with young people, running youth clubs, schools work and other activities is to enable them to overcome challenges, learn, succeed and make a positive contribution to their communities. We have a dedicated Youth Centre above the Memorial Hall in Great Shelford in Great Shelford where we run 6 youth clubs a week, as well as 3 sessions in Sawston, and a weekly club in the Community Centre in Duxford. Employing 4 Youth workers and working with six volunteers, we reach over 150 young people per week. An update on our regular activities

- Continued involvement of young people in the design of new community facilities (Skate park etc)
- Participated in community events in Harston, Duxford, and Great Shelford Feast, and much more.

Former Little Shelford resident who helped put man on the moon is recognised with a blue plaque

Francis Thomas (Tom) Bacon OBE, FRS (1904-1992), a Cambridge engineer, has been recognised with a blue plaque for developing the first practical working hydrogen-oxygen fuel cell. His fuel cells provided the secondary power for the Apollo Missions producing the electricity for the communications, air conditioning and lighting as well as drinking water for the astronauts. The Apollo 11 mission landed the first man on the moon in 1969.

Prof Clemens Kaminski, Head of the Department of Chemical Engineering and Biotechnology (CEB) at the University of Cambridge, said: "Francis Bacon's life work on fuel cells represents the spirit of innovation and sustainability that drives our department today. His invention not only helped put man on the moon, but also laid the foundation for the hydrogen fuel technology we continue to develop in our pursuit of a more sustainable future."

The fuel cell was developed at Marshall of Cambridge, where the blue plaque for Tom Bacon was unveiled. Christopher Walkinshaw, Marshall's Group Director of External Relations and Communications, said, "Tom Bacon was an exceptional engineer whose vision helped humanity reach the moon. We are delighted that he is being honoured with a blue plaque, and are very proud of Marshall's role in the development and successful demonstration of his revolutionary fuel cell technology."

On a visit to the United States, Tom met President Nixon who said: "Without you Tom, we wouldn't have gotten to the moon".

After the success of the Apollo 11 mission, Tom Bacon and his wife Barbara were invited to 10 Downing Street to meet the three Apollo 11 astronauts, Neil Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins.

Tom Bacon's son, Edward, said: "My father was determined, close to being single-minded, in his dogged perseverance to advance the case for fuel cells. He was quiet, even-tempered and disarmingly modest, tending to underplay his considerable achievements and deflect any praise onto other people. Although he was proud and relieved that the fuel cells had performed so well in the Apollo Missions, he really wanted to see fuel cells in more down-to-earth applications like distributed power generation, energy supply in remote locations, emergency power and transport.





The Cambridge & District Blue Plaque Scheme is run by **Cambridge Past, Present & Future** (www.cambridgeppf.org) and the plaque, their 41st, will be installed at 82 High Street, Little Shelford where Tom once lived.

Tom's grave in All Saints churchyard also bears testimony to his achievement.

The reason why we cannot find.



History Snippet: Celebrating New Year in Little Shelford 1912

Ever wondered what Christmas and New Year were like in Little Shelford over 100 years ago? Obviously, the Village was much more of a rural community then and by today's standards living conditions were hard. But it was interesting to find a small reference in the British Newspaper Archive of a meeting of Villagers in one local pub and to learn more about how they came together to support each other and celebrate New Year's Eve 1912. Clearly a strong sense of community existed in 1912 as well as an enthusiasm for singing, an enthusiasm and sense of community that has lasted into the 21st Century as evidenced by the many sing-a-long evenings held in the Navigator Pub over the last few years!

From the Cambridge Independent Press Friday 3 January 1913

"The annual dinner of the share-out club was held at the Prince Regent on Tuesday evening, when a very enjoyable time was spent. After the good things provided by Host and Hostess Lewin had been disposed of, the Honorary Secretary submitted the Balance Sheet, which showed that after deducting sick benefits, a substantial sum was left to be shared out among the members, numbering 63. Songs were sung during the evening by Messrs. Rodgers, Skipper, Pettitt, Goodwin, Darley, Lewin and others. The evening was brought to a close by the signing of "Auld Land Syne" and "God Save the King"

This meeting of the "Share-out club" took place on Tuesday 31st December 1912 so a combination of committee meeting and New Year's Eve celebration. Share-out clubs were very common in rural England in the second half of the 19th Century and the first half of the 20th Century. They were unregistered clubs, locally organised and their primary purpose was to provide sickness and death benefits for their members.

So, in this case 63 Villagers of Little Shelford (remember the male population of the village at this time was only about 200) had decided to create this mutual society to give each other protection against sickness and death at a time when there was no health service. They would contribute weekly; the landlord of the local pub often held the money as "banker". When someone was sick or there was a death amongst members the "Share-out club" would pay a benefit. At the end of each year any funds left would be equally shared amongst the contributing members. 1912 must have been a relatively healthy year as "a substantial sum was left to share out".

Charles and Fanny Lewin were landlord and landlady at the Prince Regent for many years and lived in the pub that until recently we knew as Sycamore House Restaurant along with their gardener son Edward Lewin. They most likely acted as the bankers for the "Share-out club" as well as hosting the New Year's Eve party. The members mentioned as singing songs included well-known village families including Rodgers and Goodwin from the High Street and Pettitt from Back Lane. It's good to read that they had such a great time and were able to celebrate the New Year and the large pay out with song!

Just a few years later, of course, many of these families sent their sons to war, Edward Lewin, Rupert Rodgers, Llewellyn Rodgers, John Goodwin and Ernest Darley all went to fight. Sadly, John Goodwin and Ernest Darley never returned.

Winter Fuel Payment, the cost of living and rural communities

disproportionate impact from the wider economic crisis. We have expanded the Cost of Living support page on our website to include additional resources which may be of interest to those affected by the loss of the Winter Fuel Payment.

Almost a fifth of England's population live in rural or coastal communities. Although countryside residents report higher feeling of wellbeing than their urban equivalents, in many ways they are disadvantaged. Rural authorities receive less per head than urban authorities, but residents pay more per head in council tax, despite it costing more to deliver the same services in rural areas. In general, rural populations are older, in poorer health, and receive a lower level of support from health and social care services. There are fewer dentists and GPs within reasonable travel distance, worse public transport, lower levels of broadband and network access, and more energy-inefficient detached, pre-1919 and off-the-gas-grid homes.

In July, the Government announced that future Winter Fuel Payments would only be made to those in England and Wales on low incomes who receive pension credit or other means-tested benefits [the Scottish government is doing the same]. This means that more than 10 million pensioners will no longer receive the payment designed to help with the cost of adequate heating.

At the same time, effective from 1 October, the energy price cap for a typical household that uses gas and electricity and pays by Direct Debit will go up from £1,568 to £1,717 per year. This increase of around 10% will add about £12 a month to an average bill. The only good news, for some, is that the cost of domestic heating oil has fallen from around 81p per litre in October 2023 to around 60p per litre on 1 October 2024 (Source: https://www.boilerjuice.com/heating-oil-prices/), but prices are notoriously volatile.

What has not been taken into consideration at all is that not only do rural consumers have to afford the high cost of oil, bottled gas, coal or smokeless fuel, but that they have to pay in a single advance payment. The pension increases coming into effect in April 2025 will be delivered in small payments in arrears, so they will not help in the slightest this winter.
